## What Do You Need for a Sentence?

## A Subject and a Predicate

A complete sentence has two parts: the **subject** and the **predicate**.

subject predicate

The man tries to escape.

To find the parts, in most sentences, ask yourself:

- **1.** Whom or what is the sentence about? Your answer is the **subject**.
- 2. What does the subject do? Your answer is the **predicate**.

| Sentence              | Whom or What? | What Does the Subject Do? |

| The man finds a tool. |               |                           |
